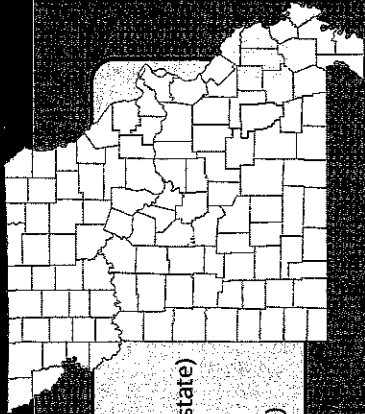
- Reviewing and refining the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP).

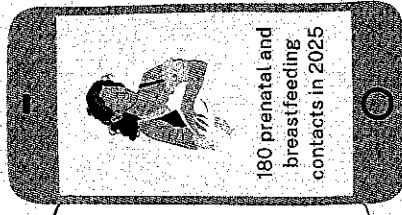
WOMEN, INFANTS, AND CHILDREN (WIC)

WHAT WE DO

Bollinger County Health Center sets aside eight clinic days each month to serve WIC clients. WIC is a supplemental nutrition education program that helps mothers and young children eat well and stay healthy. Women, infants, and children who meet income guidelines may go to any WIC provider in the state of Missouri to apply for WIC benefits. Income guidelines are established by the United States Department of Agriculture. WIC provides breastfeeding education and support, nutrition and health education, referrals, health screenings, and funds to buy nutritious foods.

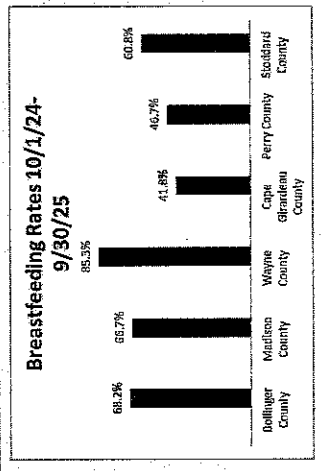
BREASTFEEDING PEER COUNSELOR PROGRAM

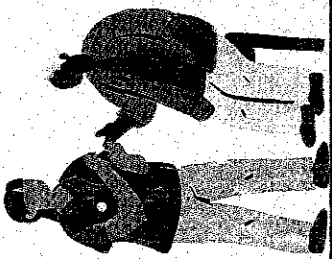
The Breastfeeding Peer Counselor (BFPC) program provides breastfeeding education and support to WIC participants. The BFPC hosts monthly breastfeeding classes, as well as a quarterly support group. The BFPC also provides one-on-one counseling to mothers via in-person conversation, text, or phone call. The Breastfeeding Peer Counselor program is able to loan out both manual and electric breast pumps. In 2025, Bollinger County Health Center received recognition as a Breastfeeding Friendly WIC Clinic for the fifteenth year in a row and was also recognized as a Missouri Breastfeeding Friendly Worksite.



BREASTFEEDING RATES 2025

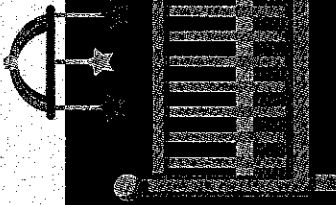
Breastfeeding initiation rates for fiscal year 2025 were 68.2%, which was below the state average of 75.4%. Breastfeeding duration rates at six months were 19.5% and 14.8% at twelve months.





Health Education Services

Nutrition and health education services are provided per request at the Health Center. Materials are provided at the annual Bollinger County Resource Fair, Bollinger County Fall Festival, Health Fair, Back-to-School Fair, and at other events as requested. Monthly presentations for Community Counseling Center's Psycho-Social-Rehab were continued throughout 2025.

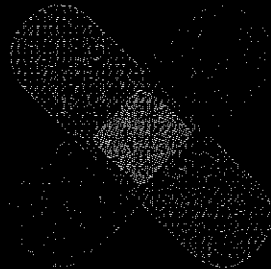


Safe Cribs for Missouri

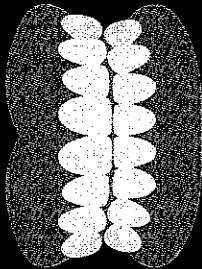
The Safe Cribs for Missouri program continued at the Health Center in 2025 under the direction of the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE). The program provides portable cribs and safe sleep education to low-income families in need. Eligibility requirements include clients being at least 34 weeks' gestation or up to 6 months postpartum at the time of the crib application. Referrals are completed and cribs are delivered to new parents with office and/or home visits conducted by public health nurses to provide education on child safety and safe sleep practices.

Lead Assessment/Testing

Missouri's children are at risk for lead poisoning, a preventable health problem which affects the brain and physical growth. Bollinger County Health Center uses a simple finger stick to test children for potential lead exposure. Verbal and written lead education material is provided to the child's parent/guardian. When elevated levels are detected, the child is followed by a nurse case manager until the lead level is within normal range. In 2025, the Health Center tested 171 children for lead exposure.



Fluoride Varnish



Though funding was not available via the Missouri Dental Association (MDA), Bollinger County Health Center continued to provide fluoride varnish to children's teeth in 2025. This service was offered to children aged 6 months - 6 years that had Medicaid coverage but had not been to a dentist in at least 6 months. Varnish was applied to 98 children's teeth in 2025.

Childcare Health Consultation

The services of a Public Health Nurse, trained in child care consultation, are available to all licensed, license-exempt, and non-regulated child care providers throughout Bollinger County. In 2025, these services supported one Head Start program, two licensed preschools, three licensed family group providers, one license-exempt preschool, one license-exempt religious organization, and one additional license-exempt facility.

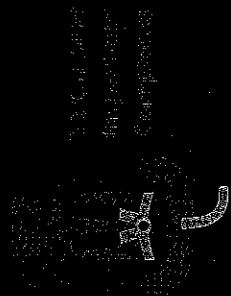

Maternal Child Health

The Maternal Child Health (MCH) grant is a federal program dedicated to improving the health of all women, children, and families. The MCH grant is in year four of its 5-year work plan. The priority health issue is to reduce obesity among children and adolescents ages 6-11 to impact the percentage of those in excellent or very good health. 1-2-3-4-5 Fit-Tastic education was distributed at the annual Bollinger County Resource Fair, Fall Festival, Meadow Heights Health Fair, Green Bear Event, and at the Back-to-School Fair. The Fit-Tastic framework promotes healthy, active lifestyles for children and families. In addition, a pamphlet highlighting local physical activity sites was developed and disseminated throughout the community. This resource serves as a practical guide for families seeking accessible opportunities to stay active and support their children's overall health.

Child Passenger Safety Technician

Bollinger County Health Center has 2 child passenger safety technicians (CPSTs). They are available to offer education regarding the best practices for keeping your children safe on the road.





2025 Resource Fair



Bollinger County Health Center staff are greatly involved in the Children and Youth Issues Coalition. Their main event is the annual Bollinger County Resource Fair, an event for families to attend and learn about local resources while enjoying activities with their children. On June 13, 2025, the coalition hosted the 19th annual event at Bollinger County Health Center. "A Call for Resources" was set up by 31 participating vendor booths. These booths provided information regarding their agency's resources, as well as fun activities for the kids. Approximately 137 community members attended.

ENVIRONMENTAL PUBLIC HEALTH

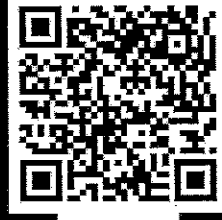
The Environmental Public Health Specialist (EPHS) inspects all school cafeterias, restaurants, taverns, retail grocers, food trucks, retail food locations, and food vendors operating in Bollinger County. In 2025, there was increased emphasis on environmental concerns due to a rise in inspections of new facilities, established food sale locations, and vendors from other counties beginning operations in Bollinger County. Food safety compliance inspections are based on several factors, including past violation history, the type of products sold, and public health risk assessments.

The EPHS also inspects daycares, Head Start facilities, and lodging establishments, and follows up on complaints regarding these locations. Currently, six daycares are inspected annually in Bollinger County, with the number expected to increase as additional facilities pursue certification and licensure through the State of Missouri. Hotel and motel inspections are now required in Bollinger County, and some businesses undergo multiple re-inspections until they meet health and safety guidelines.

Facilities inspected by the EPHS that use private wells not regulated by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) must have water samples collected at least annually to ensure safe drinking water standards. Additional samples may be collected upon request when public health concerns are documented. This service is provided free of charge to county residents, while samples submitted directly by property owners require a nominal processing fee paid to the Missouri State Laboratory. Samples are sent to the state lab through the courier system.

Onsite sewage permits are issued through the Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) by calling (573) 751-6095. Sewage complaints are inspected by the local public health agency EPHS, with findings reported to DHSS. Violations are issued by the EPHS when necessary and must be corrected in accordance with current state law.

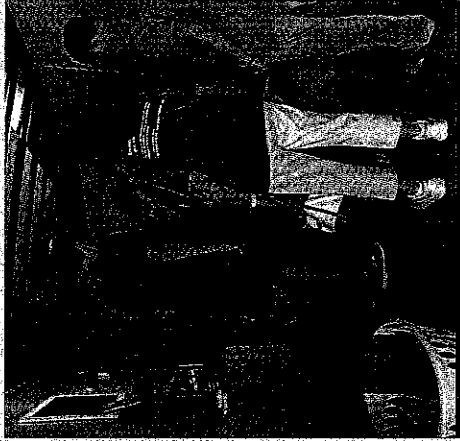

DRUG FREE COMMUNITIES

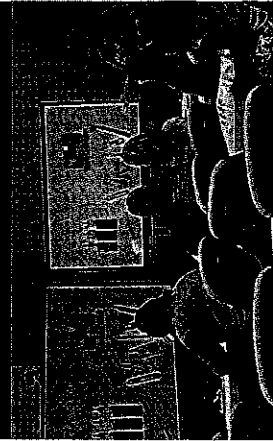
2025 was an exciting year for the Children and Youth Issues Coalition! The hiring of a full-time Program Director for the Drug Free Communities (DFC) grant significantly expanded the Coalition's capacity and impact. Access to DFC funding and dedicated staff elevated prevention efforts and strengthened the Coalition's presence within the community. The year began with a rebranding of the Coalition's logo, along with updates to printed materials and social media platforms to reflect a renewed focus and strengthened prevention mission.



HIDDEN IN PLAIN VIEW

In April, Addiction Is Real presented its "Hidden in Plain View" mock bedroom exhibit at the Health Center. Visitors were encouraged to identify indicators of teen substance use within a realistic bedroom setting.

In August, 63 educators from three area school districts toured the upgraded "Hidden in Plain View" bedroom and received education on identifying disguised vaping devices.

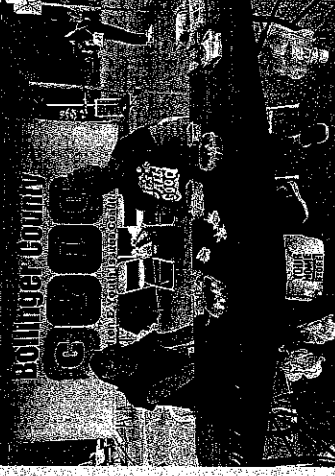

These events provided valuable opportunities to strengthen partnerships and disseminate information about the Coalition's mission and substance use prevention initiatives.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The DFC Program Director and Coalition members participated in a variety of professional development opportunities to strengthen local prevention efforts. Trainings included:

- Botvin Life Skills Training
- Developmental Relationship Train-the-Trainer
- Missouri Coalition Academy
- Tall Cop Training

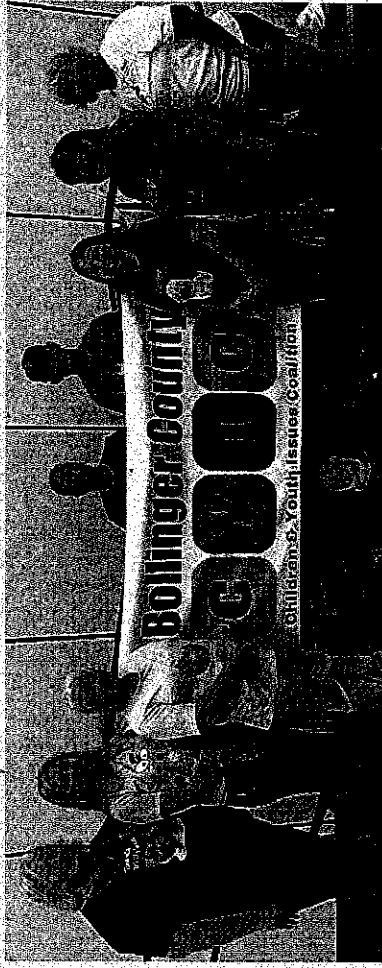


In November, the Coalition partnered with 4-H in Leopold to host Creative Fun: An Alternative to Substance Use. This Communities Talk event highlighted the 40 Developmental Assets and their role in protecting youth from risky behaviors, including substance use. The event was funded through a small grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA).

Throughout 2025, community awareness expanded and families were connected with critical prevention resources:

- 7,360 prevention and education materials distributed
- Four "Parents Who Host Lose the Most" advertisements published in the Banner Press, with corresponding messages aired on three local radio stations
- 120 new Facebook followers added

The support of the Drug Free Communities grant, combined with strong community partnerships, positioned 2025 as a year of measurable growth, collaboration, and meaningful impact.



Communicable Disease

In 2025, our public health nurses investigated 165 reports of communicable disease conditions in Bollinger County residents. The majority of these conditions were Enteric diseases, tick-borne diseases, and animal bites. Investigations are completed with interventions as necessary to protect and promote the health of our residents.

Bollinger county received a total of 371 laboratory-confirmed influenza cases for the 2024/2025 flu season. We continue to monitor Covid levels in our community. In 2025, we counted 124 positive covid cases in our residents.

Tuberculosis screenings (PPD skin tests) are offered here for \$15. We administered 76 skin tests in 2025. Our public health nurses are trained to provide case management services for TB infections. There are currently no cases of active pulmonary tuberculosis in Bollinger County.

We continue to provide no-cost screenings for chlamydia, gonorrhea, HIV, Hepatitis C & B, and syphilis. Treatment for some of these conditions is also provided here free of charge. Chlamydia remains the most frequently reported STI in our county in 2025.

Show Me Healthy Women

Bollinger County Health Center is proud to provide uninsured/underinsured women of our community free cancer screenings through the Show Me Healthy Women program. This is a free breast and cervical cancer screening program funded by the state of Missouri. The program has been expanded to include eligible women of ages 21-64. We are actively seeking to serve more women. Bollinger County Health Center was awarded an additional contract, "Improving Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening Rates", providing additional funds for community outreach and education.

In conjunction with Show Me Healthy Women, the WISEWOMAN program is utilized to measure the cardiovascular and diabetes risks a woman faces. We complete testing for blood sugar, cholesterol, blood pressure, and BMI. Goals are set with each woman and one-on-one health coaching is offered with our nursing staff.

Accreditation Assistance

The Health Center is currently transitioning from state-level accreditation through the Missouri Institute for Community Health (MICH) toward national accreditation through Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB). Supported by the Local Public Health Agency (LPHA) Accreditation Assistance Contract, staff are aligning departmental operations with the Foundational Public Health Services (FPHS) framework.

- National Standards: The department is adopting the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) standards to enhance capacity in core public health areas and ensure high-quality service delivery.
- Contractual Progress: The initial two-year LPHA Accreditation Assistance Contract concluded on November 30, 2025.
- Next Steps: Transition activities will remain a priority as a second contract is implemented, providing continued support for the rigorous initial accreditation process.

Vaccine Preventable Disease

OVERVIEW

Vaccines are available for individuals with private insurance, as well as through the Vaccines for Children (VFC) and Vaccines for Adults (VFA/817) programs. Our business operations team is working during back-to-school season and the start of the season. To meet the increased demand, we add extra clinic days and offer convenient physician offices. During the season, vaccination clinics are also hosted at various schools and businesses throughout the county. For established organizations, our state vaccination alliance provides financing for state-of-the-art on-site vaccination sites at the building.

COVID-19 & ADULT VACCINATION SUPPLEMENTAL (CAVS)

The CAVS Contract ended in Spring 2025. Prior to its end, the Health Center continued to provide education about COVID-19 vaccination and hold non-traditional vaccine clinics. The Health Center continues to offer a Friday Vaccine clinic once a month.



Bollinger County Health Center continued its mission of disaster preparedness through planning, training, and coordination with county, state, and federal partners. Our Emergency Health Planner, who has served in the role for five years, has strengthened relationships with partner agencies by coordinating resources, personnel, and supplies to ensure emergency response plans serve all Bollinger County residents.

In collaboration with Bollinger County Emergency Management and Medical Reserve Corps Unit #1033, Health Center staff play a key role in disaster response by providing expertise in disease management and medical countermeasures to support county emergency responders.

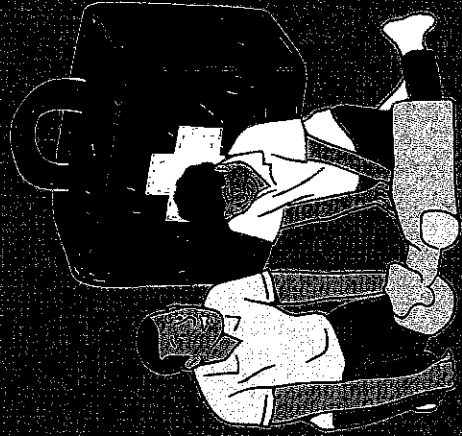

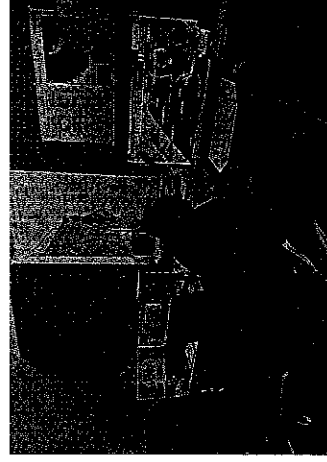
CERT training is available upon request. The 24-hour training covers disaster preparedness, terrorism, disaster fire suppression, light search and rescue operations, disaster medical operations, disaster simulation, disaster psychology, and team organization. This training gives the community an opportunity to be better prepared to survive a catastrophic disaster. One CERT training was held at Bollinger County Health Center in 2025.

Storm Safe Room

Bollinger County residents, visitors, and anyone who is within the Marble Hill Tornado Protection Zone (TPZ) at the time of a **TORNADO WARNING** are welcome to take refuge in the storm safe room. The facility will be opened and available whenever a **TORNADO WARNING** is issued for the area designated as the Marble Hill TPZ.

The safe room is designed and operated following Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) standards. The intended duration for operation with this type of facility is short duration stays (under 2 hours), or until the **TORNADO WARNING** has passed.

The Storm Safe Room was opened and received visitors 3 times in 2025 for **TORNADO WARNINGS**. A total of 126 individuals utilized the Safe Room during those instances.

“Spring Into Wellness” Health Fair

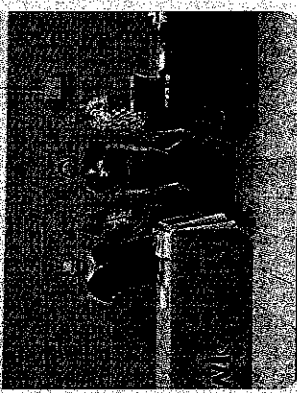
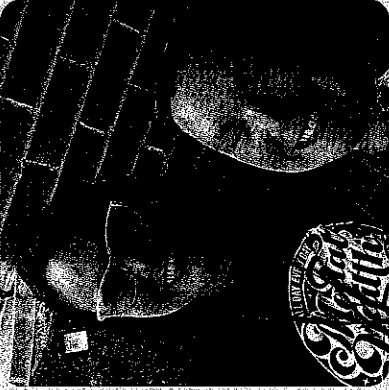
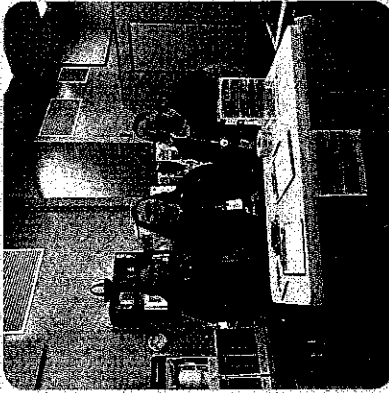
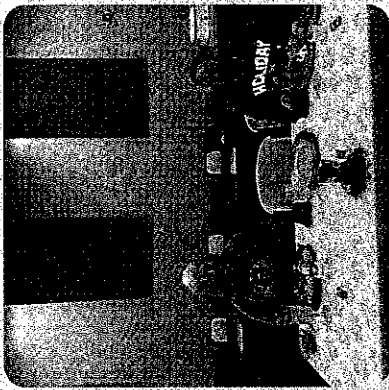
